The children and families we serve are resilient and our staff provide the support and guidance they need during some of the most difficult times in their lives.



We have been fortunate to have the support of the community and

especially state and government leaders who this year made more support available for nonprofit agencies across Kentucky. Thanks to coordinated advocacy efforts, Child Advocacy Centers across the state received increased funding and resources to benefit children throughout the state and to help more children. We are so grateful for those who used their voices to speak up and speak out for children and families impacted by abuse and violence.

Thanks to our connections with community organizations and businesses like the Louisville Orchestra, the University of Louisville, Tri-Arrows Aluminum and First Savings Bank, we have been able to provide children with incredible learning experiences and opportunities to engage with each other creatively.

While there were many positives over the past year, we certainly overcame challenges. Unfortunately, we experienced on-going difficulties in recruiting qualified, professional staff to provide services our community needs. Without adequate funding for staff, we were forced to limit the number of families and children who could participate in our programs to receive the crucial support they needed to be safe, happy, and healthy. Nearly two hundred families needed our counseling services, but due to funding reductions, we were not able to serve them.

For nearly 140 years, Family & Children's Place has fought for children and the strength of families in our community. Every year, we know we will face adversity but each time, I know we have the staff, donors, volunteers and community partnerships to adapt and overcome. I am so proud of the relationships we've built with our supporters and so very grateful for your trust in the agency.

There is still work to do, but with your continued dedication and investment, we know FCP can help more children and their families to have happy, healthy futures.



As both a participant and staff member in the Greater Louisville Head Start program, Diana shared her unique and inspiring story for the first time during the 2022 Champions for Children Breakfast.

Thank you to Diana and her family for their bravery and willingness to share their story to help parents throughout our community know they are not alone.



Greater Louisville Head Start

- Early Head Start programming has extended to include expectant parents.
- Early Head Start has provided families with healthy foods and produce, diapers, PPE, home safety kits, backpacks, school supplies for siblings, coats and toys.
- Provided opportunities for family trips and socialization activities at the Louisville Zoo, pumpkin patch, Dare to Care Food Bank kitchen, and multiple parks throughout Jefferson Co.



HANDS

- 59 families stayed with us until their child turned 2, maintained consistent visits and graduated from the HANDS program!
- · We served a total of 426 families during the fiscal year and maintained a consistent enrollment of around 200 families at any time throughout the year. This is an increase compared to the 365 families served in fiscal year 2021.
- We increased our referrals from 673 in fiscal year 2021 to 961 referrals in fiscal year 2022.



Child Advocacy Center

- Emmie, the facility dog, celebrated her 5th birthday and continues to bring support and joy to the children who visit us.
- Renovations were completed on the brand new office in Jeffersonville, IN which opened and began seeing children.



Program Highlights

School-Based Services

• Meyzeek Middle School students partnered with the Center for Social Justice Youth Development Research to complete a yearlong PhotoVoice project which culminated in a gallery opening in the summer.

- Program enrollment at Engelhard Elementary School has more than tripled in the past year.
- The program began or continued partnerships with over a dozen local organizations to bring new experiences and learning opportunities to the children in our schools.

Central Louisville Coalition

- The Coalition sponsored and co-hosted 2 Large Back to School Drives, serving over 400 Families.
- Partnerships and collaborations with nearly 20 member and non-member organizations, businesses, elected officials and community leaders have increased the reach of Coalition initiatives.



Counseling Services

- Counseling services have joined with school-based services to provide valuable after school programs along with therapy two days per week at Meyzeek Middle School. This is a partnership we have been working on creating and offering to Meyzeek Students, staff and families for over 2 years!
- We are working to give our "forecast services" a face lift to better meet the needs of clients through our CHFS program. Improvements to include: quicker access to services by clients/ parents and giving specific referrals to clients, within the city, to prepare them for reunification.
- Our Child Welfare team offered outstanding services in area supervised visitation over the past year. A high percentage of families and children moved from supervised to unsupervised, or were reunified in the past year because of these wonderful services and the staff that provided them.
- We saw over a 24% increase in African/American and Black community members being served by our services. This is the highest increase we have seen in at least 7 years.


